






Requests For Service 5 Year









Statistical Analysis

The attached spreadsheet shows a total of 374 calls for the three-month period. This includes the total number of calls responded to by Yountville Station personnel. The breakdowns of emergency calls in the Town of Yountville are as follows:

Medical Aids:	66
Public Assists:	11
Traffic Collisions:	1
Vehicle Fires:	0
Alarm Soundings:	7
Structure Fires:	1
Vegetation Fires:	0
Miscellaneous Fires:	0
Rescues:	0
Hazardous Conditions:	3
Tree/Power Lines Down:	0

Of the total 374 calls for service, the breakdown according to response area is as follows:

Town of Yountville:	89 Calls
Veterans Home:	136 Calls
County Areas:	148 Calls
Napa City:	1 Call

Calls for the Veterans Home This Quarter:

Medical Aids:	127 Calls
Alarm Soundings:	7 Calls
Public Assists:	1 Call
Hazardous Conditions:	1 Call

These averages are mostly consistent with history and call analysis. As is typical with virtually all fire departments today, our largest call volume continues to be medical emergencies.

Major Events

Structure Fires:

On March 25th Engine and Truck 12 responded to a fire at Coqueta. We arrived at scene and found light smoke coming from underneath a few of the roof tiles. Truck 12 made access to the roof and began pulling up the tiles to try and locate the source of the smoke. The little bit of smoldering material that was found was easily extinguished with a garden hose. Crews remained at scene for about an hour ensuring there was no extension of the fire into any other parts of the structure. We do this by using a Thermal Imaging Camera that will detect heat signatures through walls and other materials.

Other Type Fires:

Yountville personnel responded to multiple other type fires throughout this quarter. We had two separate incidents within a few days of each other of spot fires along the train tracks of the Wine Train. In both instance the fires were only in the grass and very slow moving, so crews were able to extinguish both fires quickly. Station personnel also responded to two vehicle fires. One was located off Dry Creek Rd and the other was on Ragatz Ln.

Equipment Maintenance:

Annual ladder testing, inspection, and cleaning has been completed this quarter on all station apparatus.

Training:

We are privileged to be stationed near the Napa County Training Grounds and always stay busy with training. Not only do we try to train daily on various topics with our crew at Station 12, we also have our monthly drills with the surrounding stations. We are tasked with a specific topic for each month and train with multiple other engine crews. Annually, thousands of hours are dedicated to learning and perfecting our trade so that we may provide the best service available. January kicked off with another Napa County Volunteer Academy. The personnel at Station 12 help train the new volunteer recruits on the fundamentals of fire, rescue, and EMS operations. The pool of students is comprised

of recruits from the nine volunteer stations located throughout the County of Napa. Once completed with the training program, the recruits will be assigned to their respective stations where they will respond to emergency incidents. Sterling Vineyards in Calistoga allowed us to utilize a couple of structures on the property for interagency training purposes. It's an excellent opportunity to use a real structure for scenario based training on all of our tactical priorities on a structure fire.

Prevention:

We like to be involved within the community not only with special events but spreading knowledge and teaching fire prevention. With daylight savings falling in this quarter we were available to assist residents with battery changing of smoke detectors, a service we are always happy to offer year-round.

Safety Message
